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Second-tier men's magazine from the mid-'70s, containing the then-typical mix of nude models, a smattering of reviews, fiction & nonfiction. In the late '60s, Cavalier was actually one of the hippest of its bunch, publishing the likes of R. Crumb, Vaughn Bode and Paul Krassner. By August, 1974--this issue--most of the hipness was gone, although there's still a new Bode strip and a thoughtful music column from longtime critic/Patti Smith guitarist Lenny Kaye. But the real reason for this issue's value, is, as it coyly states on the front cover, "A Great New Story by the Author of 'Carrie'." For four years prior to this, Stephen King published several of his early stories in Cavalier (occasionally as "Steve KIng"). This issue saw the first publication of his short fiction "Night Surf." which takes up six pages (plus one illustrated page) here. In addition, there's a two-page interview (withaccompanied bypages of his previous six tales from the magazine) with the young writer, whose first novel CARRIE had been published just a couple of months earlier. Scarce, and a unique insight into this great horror author on the cusp of fame.
